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- Cancer Care Ontario Updates/Resources:
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## **Health System Innovation:**

- The Screening and Prevention Team is pleased to share the attached Cervical Screening Medical Directive Template. This document has been reviewed and available as a reference for Primary Care Providers in the community. There is no requirement or obligation to use the provided template. This template is being shared with you as an option to help increase your cervical screening rates through appropriate delegation of services to other healthcare providers on your team (i.e., RNs, RPNs, Midwives, etc.) The document is being released in a word format to allow edits so you may tailor the document further.
- As announced earlier this week by the Government of Ontario, the Ontario Breast Screening Program (OBSP) will be expanding to include people ages 40 to 49 in <u>fall 2024</u>.
  - Ontario Health will be engaging with the Regional Cancer Programs (RCPs) over the coming months on the implementation of this expansion as well as providing resources to support OBSP sites and health care providers.

The following key messages have been developed to support inquiries with key partners:

The OBSP is a province-wide organized breast screening program managed by Ontario Health.
 The program is designed to encourage people in Ontario to get screened,

- which can lower their chances of dying from breast cancer.
- Starting in **fall 2024**, people ages 40 to 49 will be able to get screened through the OBSP at one of the 241 program sites across Ontario. A referral from a primary care provider will not be required.
- To make an informed decision about breast cancer screening, people ages 40 to 49 are encouraged to discuss the benefits and risks of screening, as well as their breast cancer risk, values and preferences with a health care provider.
- Ontario Health will be working with partners, including Regional Cancer Programs, OBSP sites and providers, to support expansion of the OBSP to people ages 40 to 49.

# **Health Promotion Campaigns:**

#### **November is Lung Cancer Awareness Month:**

- Facts about Tobacco Use:
  - o Tobacco use increases the risk of nearly 20 different types of cancer.
  - o Tobacco use contributes to 30% of all cancer deaths and about 85% of lung cancer cases.
  - o In Ontario, approximately 1 in 6 new cancer patients is a current or recent tobacco user.

- Many providers are still using the old version of the form from the pilot program. The new version of the form is required for any new referrals.

- Eligibility Criteria:
  - 55 to 74 years of age
  - Smoked cigarettes daily for at least 20 years, though not necessarily consecutively

## **Cancer Care Ontario Updates/Resources:**

#### ColonCancerCheck (CCC) Program:

- ColonCancerCheck (CCC) CCC Process to Support Unattached People AVAILABLE: Registration Form for the CCC
  Program Provider List. The CCC program provider list is used to support people without
  primary care providers (i.e., unattached) who are at increased risk for colorectal cancer or have an abnormal
  fecal immunochemical test result (i.e., FIT-positive).
  - Physicians can register for the CCC program provider list by completing and submitting the Provider Registration for Patient Attachment form to the Contact Centre at cancerinfo@ontariohealth.ca.

  - Nurse Practitioners (NPs) can also register and support unattached patients.
  - o Providers on the CCC program provider list are <u>not</u> required to support comprehensive care for unattached people and can remove themselves from this list at any time.
  - Responsibilities of enrolled providers:
    - Receive the FIT+ result or assess risk level/verify screening history, as appropriate
    - Provide a referral for appropriate next steps (e.g., colonoscopy or FIT kit)
    - As requested by endoscopist, support the communication of colonoscopy results and follow-up instructions with patient

#### **Ontario Breast Screening Program (OBSP):**

- On October 16, 2023, the Ontario Breast Screening Program (OBSP) started to screen people with breast implants and Two-Spirit, Trans and Nonbinary people in accordance with updated eligibility criteria.
  - People with breast implants who were previously excluded from participating in the OBSP may now be
    eligible and may begin receiving invitation letters. People who have breast implants who meet OBSP
    eligibility criteria can be screened in the OBSP without a referral.



- Two-Spirit, Trans and Nonbinary people currently participating in the OBSP may begin to receive normal
  result, recall and recall reminder letters based on their screening history, regardless of what sex designation
  the
  - Ministry of Health has on file for them. Individuals do not require an invitation letter from Ontario Health to be screened in the OBSP. As long as participants meet the OBSP <u>eligibility criteria</u>, they can be screened in the program.
  - Since Ontario Health uses data from the Ministry of Health and other clinical sources to identify who is eligible to receive OBSP invitation letters and these sources use binary sex information (i.e., male/female),
    - Ontario Health remains unable to accurately identify all Two-Spirit, trans and nonbinary people who are eligible for OBSP invitation letters.
  - OBSP eligibility criteria has been updated to include transfeminine participants who have received feminizing hormone for at least 5 consecutive years. There is no proof of this eligibility required.
     Patients meeting this criteria may self-refer to the average risk Ontario Breast Screening Program.

#### Impacts of these OBSP Updates to Primary Care Providers:

- PCPs may begin advising their patients with breast implants that, as of October 16, a referral is no longer required for breast screening. Patents may contact OBSP sites directly to book their appointments.
